### Recruiting Basics

73% of all Americans (ages 17-24) are not qualified for military service
Average wait time to enter basic training (when qualified): 4-6 months
Top 3 reasons to join: pride/self-esteem/honor; travel; and gain experience/work skills
87.9% of Air Force enlistees score at or above the 50th percentile of the ASVAB test
